What are you currently working on / what is your current role?

I've recently started working on Community at Pop Products, helping generate awareness and engagement with a couple of innovative B2C and B2B products.

Why do you work remotely, and how does it feel?

I work best when I'm in control of my own work hours. I've often found my best work happens deep into the night, and working remotely allows me to do that without disrupting or impacting others. To me, working remotely makes work part of your life. The two become complementary, instead of work being a means to an end.

How did you find your first remote job/gig?

I have freelanced as a side-gig for the past decade, and found all my clients online. This naturally progressed to a full-time remote freelance gig at the end of 2015, and recently to a full-time job.

What's your #1 advice for anyone who want to get started on remote work?

I always recommend anyone interested in remote working takes on small, remote freelancing side-gigs first. There's no training when it comes to remote working, and not everyone can naturally manage their own time or keep themselves accountable. Freelance side gigs are a great way to train yourself to be a successful remote worker.

What are you currently working on / what is your current role?

I'm a Virtual Assistant Staffer, Host of the Admin to VA Summit, VA Consultant & Trainer, Bestselling Author

Why do you work remotely, and how does it feel?

I started working remotely as a virtual assistant because I didn't want to choose between my family and doing the work I loved as an assistant. It has since grown to so much more. It feels amazing. I never imagined it would now allow me to work and travel to 12 countries in 12 months.

How did you find your first remote job/gig?

My first remote job was as an employee. My employer didn't want to lose me and I told him he didn't have to. I simply asked to become a virtual assistant. At the time neither of us really knew what that meant. He asked me to draft a proposal of how it would work. I drafted the proposal, we met again so he could approve, and then I met with the team I worked with to make sure I hadn't forgotten anything.

After a short time, I realized that if I could work remotely for them I could do it for myself. With no real understanding of what it meant to be a business owner, I went out on my own.

How did you find your first remote job/gig?



What are you currently working on / what is your current role?

I am a software developer at the <u>Shadow Robot Company</u>, a company famous for producing the most dexterous hand in the world and now in the process of developing the <u>Smart Grasping System</u>. Being part of the software team, I am involved not only in developing the software for the robot hands we produce, but also participating in different research projects with a wide range of applications such as agriculture, surgery, tele-operation or robot home assistants.

Why do you work remotely, and how does it feel + How did you find your first remote job/gig?

I worked in the Shadow London office for over a year, but I decided to move back to Colombia, my home country, as raising my daughter apart from my family was proving exhausting. When I told Shadow that I wanted to go back, they were open minded and gave me the opportunity to continue to work for them remotely. After living in Bogota for a few months, I couldn't be happier. I am still enjoying being part of the software team, doing what I love and at the top of the robotics field with a lot of exciting projects.

What's your #1 advice for anyone who want to get started on remote work?

I don't have experience finding a remote work as I found mine after working for my company locally. Although I feel that it is also an option to find a job for others, as you could approach a company looking for someone with your profile and ask them if they are willing to consider you

to work remotely. After you find a remote job, you still have to learn how to improve your productivity. I feel it is not easier to focus when you don't have an office environment, so my advice for anyone started on remote work is to take time researching and experimenting with different tools/apps and see what works for you. I found especially helpful doing my todo list using the <u>Bullet Journal</u> and <u>taking specific times for focus</u> and rest periods. Also moving from your home to a different environment has helped my to concentrate more. In our company, all the software team members are connected with Slack and I found it very useful as I somehow I feel that I am not alone and that I get help as if I were back in the office.

What are you currently working on / what is your current role?

I'm a front-end JavaScript developer with a focus on React development. I founded the <u>Remote</u> <u>Works podcast</u> and blog about remote work and culture at <u>Cultivate Now</u>.

Why do you work remotely, and how does it feel?

My reason for working remote is my family. I resigned from my commuter job in 2008, 2 weeks after my daughter was born. My desire and goal was to be present in my family's life and have some flexibility of schedule. It has also allowed for my wife being able to pursue a career in the equine industry and find a balance.

How did you find your first remote job/gig?

Through my personal network. I started off with small project based work referred through friends and colleagues. The first year was a challenge but I had faith and hustle and it turned out well.

What's your #1 advice for anyone who want to get started on remote work?

First, have a specific reason for why you want to work remote as there will be significant challenges and knowing your "why" will help you persevere through it. Second, look for an opportunity that has a 100% remote culture. For your first remote gig, it will be easier if they've fully embraced remote and will help you learn to be "remote". Finally, be patient for the right opportunity, there are many remote opportunities that are just as bad as bad commuter opportunities.
